Last summer, as the Council celebrated our 65th anniversary, we took time to honor our history by developing an archive. Looking forward, we recognized a need to change our mission statement from "independence" to "empowerment."

Our first 65 years were devoted to promoting the dignity and independence of people who are blind and visually impaired. Our predecessors laid a path for forward-

thinking legislation, a vision services model and education to enhance independence. To honor and preserve this history, board and staff together have embarked on an archive project. While still in its early stages, the project brings together Council historians and volunteers eager to learn about the Council.

Moving forward, we recognize that the blindness and visually impaired community continues to grow in its diversity and expectations. Elders are experiencing vision changes and sight loss in large numbers. Many working-age adults seek fulfilling employment, accessible transportation and want to be fully integrated into their communities. Many young adults see vision impairment as one of the aspects of self, along with gender, race, and orientation.

A board member urged us to consider a more inclusive mission statement. We, as a staff and board, concluded the word empowerment captured this changing landscape, with the mission to "promote the dignity and empowerment of the people of Wisconsin who are blind and visually impaired." It encourages us to hold the bar of excellence high for living our mission and building on the incredible work that has laid this foundation on which we now stand.

ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

In 2017, we added an assistive technology specialist to the Vision Services team. Jim Denham helps clients find technology that is right for them from computer software to iPhones. LOW VISION EVALUATIONS

In 2017, the Council continued to grow working relationships with Madison eye care professionals. Referrals from local clinics help promote the Council's empowering services.

COUNCIL WEBINARS

WCBVI webinars give people a chance to learn skills from home. In the "Providing Health and Social Services" webinar, panelists shared personal experiences from interacting with healthcare providers and suggested ways staff could better serve patients experiencing vision loss.

The November webinar gave registrants a tour of the new learning environments in the Sharper

WHITE CANE SAFETY DAY PROCLAMATION

Being at the Capitol initiated relationships with legislators and encouraged Senator LaTonya Johnson (D-Milwaukee) and Representative David Steffen (R-Howard) to introduce legislation making October 15th White Cane Safety Day. The resolution passed in both the Senate and the Assembly, with Council staff and supporters in attendance.

The Council continued to advocate for the following legislative priorities:

- 2. Employment
- 3. Education
- 4. Civil Rights/ADA
- 5. Healthcare
